Turning the Page to the Next Chapter

Public education has been a part of our community fabric since the late 19th century. The engraved limestone on the exterior wall of the Greenfield-Central corporation office on

North Street highlights that the building was constructed in 1895. As a former history teacher, I find that to be incredible.

Our facilities have looked quite different over the last 130 years, and we have structured learning in many different ways. And yet one theme

has always emerged in our community; we have demonstrated a commitment to meet the needs of all the students we serve. In fact, "Learning for All" is a consistent mantra we have repeated in Greenfield-Central for many years, and I do not see that changing anytime in the near future.

For a quick history lesson, I will clarify that the alignment of schools we now call Greenfield-Central (GC) began in 1969. Our school corporation was established in an era when Indiana transitioned from nearly 1000 public school corporations to approximately 300 in a span of less than

20 years. When GC was created, we utilized the schools that existed from the corporations previously named Greenfield Schools and Hancock-Central Schools. When this merger occurred, a new high school was built, and the previous high

school facilities were repurposed to support younger students. Therefore, in its inaugural year, Greenfield-Central had one high school, two middle schools, and four elementary schools. With a few minor adjustments along the way, GC maintained this structure for forty years. Yes, it should be noted that J.B. Stephens Elementary School was opened in 2001, and Lincoln Park Elementary was closed at that time. Additionally, elementary schools changed from serving K-6 to K-5 students.

The last major restructuring effort conducted in Greenfield-Central occurred in 2010. At that time, the corporation constructed a new junior high school and utilized

the former middle schools as intermediate schools, where students in grades 4-6 were placed. GC kept that structure in place for fifteen years until this past fall, when fourth-grade students returned to the elementary setting.

Beginning in the fall of 2026, Greenfield-Central will make its first significant structural shift in 16 years by combining its existing intermediate schools. All Greenfield-Central students in grades 5 and 6 will be instructed at Maxwell Intermediate School beginning August 3rd. In this combined setting, GC will expand curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular opportunities for these students, and the corporation

is excited to see what this unlocks for adolescent learners.

We also want to highlight an additional exciting opportunity for high school students

that becomes a reality this fall. After many years of planning and collaboration with Hancock County's elected officials and partner school corporations, the county will be opening the Hancock County Career Center at Amplify Hancock. In this state-of-the-art facility located on the northwest corner of 200 West and 300 North, high school students will be able to participate in a variety of career and technical

education (CTE) courses. Amplify Hancock will also have courses offered for adult learners through a partnership with Ivy Tech and Hancock Health.

The collaboration that transpired over the last few years to make this happen is nothing short of amazing. There is nothing else like Amplify in the state of Indiana. Greenfield-Central students will have opportunities to attain industry certifications, college credits, and trade-specific skills in a fantastic facility now located on the western border of our school corporation boundary. I am confident that our students will participate in these opportunities as they align with their educational and career goals.

The next chapter for Greenfield-Central Schools is certain to be an exciting time for our students of all ages. I cannot wait to keep turning the pages to see what the future holds for our children and young adults.

MEDICATIONS

School personnel will only administer medications needed to maintain a child in school and which must be given during school hours. Once a day medication and first morning doses are to be given at home. The parent is to provide the medication and any supplies necessary to administer the medication. This includes dixie cups for water, spoons, syringes, applesauce, crackers, etc. Please bring medication to your school's health assistant during open registration times prior to the first day of school. Please visit the Health Services tab of the corporation website for further details regarding medication guidelines and forms. Should you have questions regarding immunizations or any health related item, please call 317.462.9211 to speak with the corporation nurse. You may also email the corporation nurse, Dawn Hanson, at dhanson@gcsc.k12.in.us.

HepB: The minimum age for the third dose of Hepatitis B is 24 weeks of age.

DTaP: Four doses of DTaP/DTP/DT are acceptable if fourth dose was administered on or after the fourth birthday.

Polio*: Three doses of Polio are acceptable for all grade levels if the third dose was given on or after the fourth birthday and at least six months after the previous dose. **For students in grades K-12, the final dose must be administered on or after the fourth birthday and be administered at least six months after the previous dose.*

Varicella: Physician documentation of disease history, including month and year, is proof of immunity for children entering preschool through 12th grade. Parent report of disease history is not acceptable.

Tdap: There is no minimum interval from the last Td dose.

MCV4: Individuals who receive their first dose on or after their 16th birthday only need one dose of MCV4.

Hepatitis A: The minimum interval between first and second dose is six calendar months. Two doses are required for all grade levels.

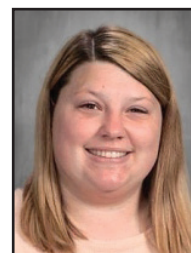

Greenfield-Central Police Department

CHIEF QUINN DOBBINS serves as Chief of Police for the Greenfield-Central Police Department, the school corporation's independent law enforcement agency serving students, staff, and district facilities throughout Greenfield-Central Community School Corporation.

Chief Dobbins is a combat veteran with more than two decades of combined military, law enforcement, and emergency management experience. He previously served with the Maryland State Police, retiring after supervisory and operational leadership assignments involving criminal enforcement, emergency operations, homeland security coordination, and critical incident response. In addition to his law enforcement career, Dobbins served in the United States Army as an Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) technician before retiring from military service.

Chief Dobbins is a graduate of the FBI National Command Course, an executive leadership program focused on modern law enforcement leadership, organizational strategy, and public safety operations.

As Chief of Police, Dobbins has led the development of the Greenfield-Central Police Department from the ground up, establishing policies, training standards, emergency response procedures, and organizational systems designed specifically for a modern school environment. His focus is on building a professional and operationally capable department that becomes permanently integrated into the culture, safety, and support structure of the school corporation.

The Greenfield-Central Police Department operates with the motto "Guardians of Those Who Learn and Teach" and works closely with school administrators, first responders, and community partners to strengthen school safety across the district. The department provides a dedicated and consistent law enforcement presence in schools while supporting emergency preparedness, safety planning, rapid-response coordination, and positive daily relationships with students and staff. The department is committed to maintaining a professional and trusted law enforcement presence that supports both safety and the overall educational mission of the school corporation.

ADA compliance notice policy statement

It is the policy of the Greenfield-Central Community School Corporation not to exclude qualified individuals with disabilities from participation in or benefiting from the services, programs, or activities of the school corporation. It is also the policy of this school corporation not to discriminate against a qualified individual with a disability in its job application procedures; the hiring, advancement or discharge of employees; employee compensation; job training, conditions and privileges or employment. It is the intention of this school corporation to comply with all applicable requirements of the American With Disabilities Act (ADA)

Members of the public, individuals with disabilities and groups representing individuals with disabilities, are encouraged to submit suggestions to school corporation officials on how the Greenfield-Central Community School Corporation might better meet the needs of individuals with disabilities pursuant to this stated policy.

Rights & protections the ADA affords disabled persons

Any individual who believes he/she has received treatment inconsistent with the policies set forth above

or any other requirement of the ADA may take any or all of the following steps:

1. Contact Mrs. Robin LeClaire, designated school corporation ADA coordinator, at 317.462.4434, or stop by her office at 110 W. North Street, Greenfield, IN 46140, to obtain additional information about the school corporation program, service, activity, or employment practice that is the basis for concern. The ADA coordinator will also provide information on how the corporation is attempting to meet the requirements of the ADA.
2. File a grievance with the ADA coordinator. The ADA coordinator will provide information on the school corporation's procedure for handling complaints based upon ADA rules and regulations.
3. Appeals of decisions or other actions of the ADA coordinator are permitted under the grievance procedures. If the ADA coordinator does not adequately respond to a grievance to the complainant's satisfaction, the grievance will be forwarded to the school corporation's ADA grievance committee for review and for appropriate action. Decisions of the grievance committee may be appealed to the Board of School Trustees of the Greenfield-Central Community School Corporation.
4. Individuals also have the right to initiate private lawsuits against the school corporation as a means for compelling school compliance with the requirements of the ADA.
5. An individual may file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Justice-Office of Civil Rights alleging discrimination in violation of the ADA requirements. An individual may file a complaint alleging a violation of the ADA employment regulations with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.
